**MEDICARE PREMIUM INCREASE:** For those of you who are on Medicare, read the article below. It's a short but important article that you probably haven't heard about in the mainstream news: The per person Medicare insurance premium will increase from the present **monthly fee of \$96.40**, rising to: **\$104.20** in 2012; **\$120.20** in 2013; and **\$247.00** in 2014.

These are provisions incorporated in the **2010 Health Care Reform Act**, purposely delayed so as not to 'confuse' the 2012 re-election campaigns. This is the amount **automatically deducted from your monthly Social Security check**.

### **Interesting Veterans Statistics off the Vietnam Memorial Wall:**

Most of the surviving Parents are now Deceased. There are 58,267 names now listed on that polished black wall, including those added in 2010. The names are arranged in the order in which they were taken from us by date and within each date the names are alphabetized. Beginning at the apex on panel 1E and going out to the end of the East wall, appearing to recede into the earth (numbered 70E - May 25, 1968), then resuming at the end of the West wall, as the wall emerges from the earth (numbered 70W - continuing May 25, 1968) and ending with a date in 1975. Thus the war's beginning and end meet. A 36 year period. The first known casualty was Richard B. Fitzgibbon, of North Weymouth, Mass. Listed as having been killed on June 8, 1956. His name is listed on the Wall with that of his son, Marine Corps Lance Cpl. Richard B. Fitzgibbon III, who was killed on Sept. 7, 1965.

- There are three sets of fathers and sons on the Wall.
- 39,996 on the Wall were just 22 or younger.
- 8,283 were just 19 years old; 33,103 were 18 years old;
- 12 soldiers on the Wall were 17 years old; 5 soldiers on the Wall were 16 years old; One soldier, PFC Dan Bullock was 15 years old.
- 997 soldiers were killed on their first day in Vietnam.
- 1,448 soldiers were killed on their last day in Vietnam.
- 31 sets of brothers are on the Wall.
- 54 soldiers on attended Thomas Edison High School in Philadelphia.
- 8 Women are on the Wall. Nursing the wounded.
- 244 soldiers were awarded the Medal of Honor during the Vietnam War; 153 of them are on the Wall.
- Beallsville, Ohio with a population of 475 lost 6 of her sons.
- West Virginia had the highest casualty rate per capita in the nation. There are 711 West Virginians on the Wall.
- The Marines of Morenci, AZ (pop. 5,058) Nine High School seniors enlisted in the Marine Corps. as a group on Independence Day 1966. Only 3 returned home.
- The most casualty deaths for a single day was on January 31, 1968 ~ 245 deaths.
- The most casualty deaths for a single month was May 1968 - 2,415 casualties were incurred.

For most Americans who read this they will only see the numbers that the Vietnam War created. To those of us who survived the war, and to the families of those who did not, we see the faces, we feel the pain that these numbers created. We are, until we too pass away, haunted with these numbers, because they were our friends, fathers, husbands, wife's, sons and daughters. There are no noble wars, just noble warriors.

### **Army Cutting 50,000 Soldiers:**

U.S. Army plans to reduce its number of Soldiers by nearly 50,000 during a five-year span, a **Lt. Gen. Thomas P. Bostick** said. The service personnel chief said the reductions would start in March 2012. The Army will cut forces in various ways, including buyouts, voluntary and involuntary separations and retirements, to bring the total to 520,400 active-duty Soldiers by Sept. 30, 2016, the report said.

Bostick said the Army would focus first on the temporary 22,000-Soldier increase started three years ago to support The troop surge in Afghanistan. A second phase will involve Soldiers added during an expansion that began in 2007. "We are currently reviewing the lessons drawn from the 1990s as captured in reports by the Army, Congressional Budget Office and the other services to ensure that we retain as much experience as possible from the ongoing conflicts [in Iraq and Afghanistan]."

**Americal Legacy Comes Alive:** In June of this year the ADVA Legacy committee submitted its final text for the new monument planned for the National Infantry Museum at Fort Benning, GA. The text outlines the Americal Division's history that is planned for the monument's back panels. Another portion of the display will honor those members of the Division who were awarded the Congressional Medal of Honor. It was decided during our recent annual reunion in Colorado Springs, CO to have the 2012 reunion in Georgia. Atlanta is the choice location because of easy and economical transportation. The dates are not firmed up as yet but it looks like September or October is preferred. The reunion will serve as a means to allow Americal Division members to see their legacy preserved for future reference and honor. Dedication ceremonies are being planned for the Atlanta reunion. We anticipate a large attendance, so plan accordingly. More to come later as planning continues.



**Site Chosen For Army Museum:** The North Post of Fort Belvoir, VA will be the home of the U.S. Army Museum, scheduled to open in June 2015. Museum construction will be funded privately through the Army Historical Foundation, a non-profit organization. Initial work will include a multistory main museum building with exhibit halls, a theater, food service and retail areas, and an experiential learning center. The Army is the only service without a centralized museum. The National Museum of the Marine Corps is at Marine Corps Base Quantico, VA; the National Museum of the U.S. Navy is at the Washington, DC., Navy Yard; the National Museum of the Air Force is at Wright-Patterson AFB, Ohio; and the Coast guard Museum is at the U.S. Coast Guard Academy in New London, CT.

**Caregivers Receive First Payments:** A VA program that provides stipends to family members who care for troops wounded since Sept. 11, 2001, issued its first payments recently. The first group of 176 caregivers trained through VA's *Comprehensive Assistance for Family Caregivers* program received an average of \$ 1,600 in monthly stipends. The amounts of the stipends are based on the condition of the veteran, the amount of care he or she requires and the geographic location of the veteran. Since May 9, 1,250 caregivers have applied for the program which includes comprehensive training. Doing Elbrus in Russia next in the Spring/Summer of 2012 and Denali in Alaska is Summer of 2013. Hope to do 6 of the 7 major mountain summits. Can't do Everest, too old. **I** remember in 1969 when Delta 2/1 (I think) was working with us out in the sands. This particular day we were the lead squad directly behind Delta. They had some contact up front that slowed things down. While taking a break, I was nosing around and found several spider holes. The rear troops from Delta said "don't bother checking those out... our guys up front already did!" Being rather skeptical, as I can be, I decided to do some investigating of my own. I found a bloody GI bandage, and a Chicom hidden in that first hole. I decided, to put one of my grenades in next to the Chicom, and then proceeded to tie one end of that bandage, to the ring of my grenade, (I had pre-straightened the pull ring pin). I had wedged the two grenades in the spider hole with some fallen banana tree logs. (Perhaps I may have done this after witnessing someone's attempt to blow an enemy grenade in place). Anyway, we got a "Fire in the hole" and everyone went over the closest berm, prior to my getting ready to yank on the other end of that used GI bandage. I gave it a quick jerk, and ran perpendicular to the hole, along the berm it was located in. Laid out there, waiting for the big bang.... which never came! As people started peeking their heads up, and looking back over at me. They pointed behind me... It seems the bandage got caught on my web-belt on my canteen top, located out on my right hip. And I had drug that GI grenade out of that hole, and it was not more than 5 or 6 feet behind me! Talk about a pucker factor... after my nerves steadied enough to unattached myself from the GI grenade, I could see that one prong on the pin was not as straight as I first thought. So I carefully picked it up, and return to drop it in that spider hole next to the Chicom, (right after pulling the pin by hand, and doing the spoon drop method...) What a hoot now, but I was sure shaking then! I had amazed & quickly amused those drag end grunts from Delta, in a matter of minutes... They couldn't believe their guys had missed that stuff, and they couldn't believe I almost blew myself up, only minutes after finding that same stuff!!!! LOL

My Guardian Angel was working overtime on this and so many other occasions, like my tripped booby-trap leaving Tien Phuc, as we were putting out trip-flares for our one last night there in March of '69"!!!! Come to think of it, the same company Delta was up front of us that same day too. And there lead squad hit a booby-trap on the front side of that same hill then as well! (The only difference was at Tien Phouc, their booby-trap went off, and messed up at least 4 grunts... and mine didn't, and saved us two? *Bo Borysiak*
